

About the Annual Institute and Videoconference



Funding was provided by the Minority Statistics Grants Program, directed by Audrey Burwell, in the National Center for Health Statistics, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention through a cooperative agreement with the Association of Schools of Public Health. The first Institute was held in 1995 and the first Videoconference in 1997. Since 2000, under the leadership of Dr. Dorothy Browne and then Dr. Victor Schoenbach, the Videoconference has been disseminated as a free satellite broadcast and webcast. Since 2007 the Videoconference has been co-presented with UNC Diversity and Multicultural Affairs.
