Small, Jr. Keynote Lecture. This year's conference will be held on Friday, February 24, 2012 in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. The theme of the conference is **"Translational Research: The Road from Efficacy to Equity."** The conference will feature Ana V. Diez-Roux, MD, PhD, MPH, Professor in the Department of Epidemiology at the University of Michigan School of Public Health, where she directs three programs: the Center for Integrative Approaches to Health Disparities, the Center for Social Epidemiology and Population Health, and the Robert Wood Johnson Health and Society Scholars Program. Dr. Diez-Roux is also Research Professor in the Survey Research Center, Institute for Social Research. Dr. Diez-Roux's keynote lecture will be broadcast online at 2 p.m. ET
